Message From the Vice President

Combining Data and Narratives Creates Balance

GGC's new Division of Student Engagement and Success (SES) launched in 2020, with Dr. Michelle Rosemond joining the GGC family as vice president of SES.

In only 15 years, GGC's holistic approach centered around student success has helped it grow into what it is today – an inclusive learning community serving about 12,000 students representing all ethnicities and walks of life. It is the multiplicity of backgrounds and synergies between faculty, staff and alumni that contribute to student success within the GGC community. I am excited to support our community by leading the Division of Student Engagement and Success (SES).

I believe data and robust analysis are essential for deep learning and greater understanding in designing student success pathways. These insights are the fuel for campus conversations about designing a relevant education for today. While I enjoy understanding the numbers, predictive analytics and designing equations, data is always balanced with narratives from students, faculty, staff and stakeholders. This balance is critical when customizing services for students from pre-orientation through graduation.

GGC students are committed, engaged and achieving, despite challenges. For example, SES surveyed almost 3,000 students as we transitioned to an Emergency Remote Teaching and Learning Model during early stages of the pandemic. 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What is the difference between academic advising, tutoring and academic coaching?

What is academic coaching?

Academic coaching is a partnership between students and a student success advisor who helps the student examine academic concerns and develop a plan to overcome barriers to success. Students will collaborate with a coach to create goals, identify relevant resources and plan action steps to support the students' academic success. Additionally, students and coaches work together to cultivate success skills, but not limited to study skills, organization, time management and test-taking strategies.

What is academic advising?

Academic advising supports students as they navigate the degree process by helping with course selection, registration, major selection and explaining academic policies and graduation requirements.
